KATHLEEN W. LEE JOINS COMMITTEE OF 100 AS PROGRAM DIRECTOR (New York, NY-November 27) – Kathleen W. Lee has joined the staff of the Committee of 100, an organization of prominent Chinese American leaders, as program director.

In this newly created position reporting to the Executive Director S. Alice Mong, Lee will be responsible for the Committee's growing array of program activities, including national and regional leadership events, and the Committee's participation in efforts to incorporate the teaching of Asia and Asian Pacific American history into American classrooms and to increase the number of Asian Pacific Americans on corporate boards, in addition to the Committee's traditional programs relating to international policy regarding Greater China and domestic policy regarding Chinese Americans.

Kathy Lee brings to the Committee of 100 more than 14 years of experience in the nonprofit world, including a tenure at the Tides Foundation and the Chinatown Community Development Center, both in San Francisco, as well as experience in government (having served at the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development), and business (including Pacific Gas & Electric Company). Lee received her Bachelor's Degree in social welfare from the University of California at Berkeley and her Master's Degree in management from Northwestern University's Kellogg School of Management. She also served as past president of the San Francisco Bay chapter of the Organization of Chinese Americans (OCA).

"We are delighted that Kathy has joined the Committee," said Bob Lee, Chairman of the Organization. "Kathy is a first-rate professional. Her breadth of experience and her energetic approach to organizational growth are a perfect fit for us as we expand into new program areas and affirmatively seek out new collaborations with other Asian Pacific American organizations."

Founded in 1989 by the eminent architect I.M. Pei, the Committee of 100 pursues a two-fold mission: to foster a sound relationship between the United States and Greater China, and to encourage increased involvement by Chinese Americans in all aspects of American life.
