Clarence Kwan has been an active C-100 member since 2006. He is a Senior Partner at Sino-Century China PE Partners, one of the earliest domestic private equity fund managers in China. Mr. Kwan is a trusted advisor to U.S., Chinese, and other global companies on cross-border investment. In addition to his current work, Clarence has held a number of national and international leadership roles at Deloitte, including National Managing Partner of the U.S. Chinese Services Group, Deputy CEO of Deloitte China, and a founding partner of Deloitte Czech Republic. Mr. Kwan was the founding chair of the China Committee of the U.S. Council for International Business, and the China Task Force of the Business & Industry Advisory Committee to the OECD, as well as acting as senior advisor to the China Association of Chief Financial Officers from 2005-2006.

Herman Y. Li is Chairman of the C & L Restaurant Group, a Franchisee of Burger King and Denny's, which owns and operates franchises in multiple states. He is a member of the executive committee of Burger King Corporation's Diversity Action Council. He is also the President of the Southern California Burger King Franchisees Association, Burger King Asian Franchisee Association and Board Member of the National Franchise Association. Herman currently serves on the Board of East West Bancorp (EWBC), as the Chairman of the Governance committee and member of the Audit committee. East West Bank is one of the largest banks in the United States that focuses on the Chinese American community, with total assets over \$7.8 billion.

CHARLIE WOO**CEO, Megatoys; Executive Board Member, Committee of 100**

Charlie Woo is the co-founder and CEO of Megatoys, a global toys wholesaler. He is known as the father of "Toytown" and is credited with turning the once blighted industrial area in Downtown Los Angeles into a thriving international trade business district. Charlie is a former Chairman of the Los Angeles Area Chamber of Commerce and has been the only Asian American to head the 126-year old business organization. He currently chairs the Workforce Investment Board for the City of Los Angeles, a body that oversees the nation's second largest workforce development. Charlie has served on the boards of many civic organizations. He was honored by the City of Los Angeles with "Dream of Los Angeles Award" in 2008 and previously with the "Volunteer Citizen of the Year Award". Mr. Chen Guoqing, with his brother, Chen Feng, founded Hainan Airlines, now known as HNA Group, in 1993. In a mere 17 years, HNA Group has become a Fortune 500 company in China. In addition to serving as a Founder of HNA Group, Chen Guoqing serves as Vice Chairman and CEO of Pacific American Corporation (PAC), a subsidiary of HNA, based in New York City. The company's business scope includes air transportation, airport management, hotel management, logistics, real estate, retail and tourism. HNA Group contributed nearly \$1.06 billion for not-for-profit causes in the past 17 years. As a philanthropist himself, Mr. Chen has made significant personal donations in recent years towards disaster relief and improving educational opportunity for marginalized communities.

DAVID HO, M.D. **CEO & Scientific Director of Aaron Diamond AIDS Research Center**



David D. Ho, M.D. is the founding Scientific Director and Chief Executive Officer of the Aaron Diamond AIDS Research Center, a world-renowned biomedical research institute. He is also the Irene Diamond Professor at The Rockefeller University. Dr. Ho has been at the forefront of AIDS research for 27 years, publishing over 350 papers. His studies, beginning in 1994, revolutionized our basic understanding of HIV, which led him to champion combination antiretroviral therapy that resulted in unprecedented control of HIV in patients. Dr. Ho's research team is now devoting considerable efforts to develop vaccines to halt the spread of the AIDS epidemic. Dr. Ho was named Time Magazine's Man of the Year in 1996, and was the recipient of a Presidential Medal in 2001.

HOWARD LI **Chairman and CEO, Waitex; Board Member, Committee of 100**



Howard H. Li is the Founder, Chairman, and CEO of Waitex Group of Companies which was established in 1981. Waitex operates distribution centers totaling nearly 3 million square feet with over 1000 employees in the United States. Waitex processes over US \$5 billion worth of consumer goods for five hundred companies annually. In China, Waitex's affiliated company is a founding partner of Florentia Village Luxury Outlet Mall and Creativo Lifestyle Mall, with a total of 8 shopping malls. The annual sales are estimated to reach 10 billion RMB upon completion. Waitex has been ranked as one of the 200 largest privately held companies in the greater New York Area by Crain's Business Magazine. Mr. Li has been selected by Forbes (Asia) as one of the 25 most influential Chinese Americans in U.S Business. In 2006, U.S President George W. Bush named Mr. Li as Commissioner of the White House and President Advisory Commission on Asian American and Pacific Islanders.

Originally conceived as the alumni network of President Obama's 100,000 Strong Initiative, Project Pengyou is public-private partnership, seeded by a multi-year grant from the Ford Foundation, and focused on next generation leadership development.

Member of Congress, U.S. Representative for New York's 6th District,



U.S. Congresswoman Grace Meng represents the Sixth Congressional District of New York encompassing the New York City borough of Queens. Grace is the first Asian-American Member of Congress from New York State, and the first female Member of Congress from Queens since former Vice Presidential nominee Geraldine Ferraro. Grace is a member of the House Foreign Affairs Committee and its Subcommittee on the Middle East and North Africa, as well as Asia and the Pacific. Grace also serves on the House Small Business Committee, where she sits on two subcommittees: Contracting and Workforce – of which she is the Ranking Member – and Agriculture, Energy and Trade. Born in Elmhurst, Queens, and raised in the Bayside section of the borough, Grace graduated from Stuyvesant High School and the University of Michigan. She then earned a law degree from Yeshiva University's Benjamin Cardozo School of Law. Grace is serving her second term in the United States House of Representatives.

RUPERT HOOGEWERF

Chairman & Chief Researcher, Hurun Report Inc.



Rupert Hoogewerf, a 45 year-old Brit, is Chairman and Chief Researcher of Hurun Report Inc, a Shanghai-based business and lifestyle media platform. Hurun Report is best known for its annual China Rich List, as well as its top-end events and market research. Hurun Report Inc reaches close to 1 million of China's business elite every month through its digital and print media platform. The monthly Hurun Report magazine is the flagship, whilst the Hurun Schools Guide: Best of US Education has become the benchmark for Chinese parents looking to send their kids to schools in the US. Rupert's contribution to the understanding of wealth in China has earned him multiple awards, notably Newweekly magazine's 2002 Person of the Year; the Magnolia Award in 2009, the Shanghai government's highest honor bestowed upon foreigners; and the All-China Women's Federation's highest annual award for its promotion of women in business in 2010.

Philanthropist; Governor, Committee of 100

He serves on the boards of The Metropolitan Museum of Art, The New York Philharmonic, The Vail Valley Foundation, The Gordon Parks Foundation, and The Dunhuang Foundation. Mr. Tang is retired from Reich & Tang, an asset management firm which he co-founded and served as President and CEO for over 20 years. Mr. Tang was educated at Phillips Academy Andover, and then received his bachelor's degree from Yale University and MBA from Harvard Business School.

RONNIE C. CHAN

Besides, Mr. Chan is Chairman of the Executive Committees of One Country Two Systems Research Institute and of Better Hong Kong Foundation. Internationally, he is Co-Chair of Asia Society and Chairman of its Hong Kong Center. Mr. Chan is also Founding Chairman Emeritus of Asia Business Council. He serves or has served on the governing or advisory bodies of several think tanks and universities, including Peter G. Peterson Institute for International Economics, World Economic Forum, Eisenhower Fellowships, Pacific Council on International Policy, Tsinghua University, Fudan University and the University of Southern California.



STEPHEN A. SCHWARZMAN

Chairman, CEO & Co-Founder, Blackstone

Stephen A. Schwarzman is Chairman, CEO, and Co-Founder of Blackstone the largest independent alternative asset manager in the world. In 2013, he founded an international scholarship program, "Schwarzman Scholars," at Tsinghua University in Beijing to educate future leaders from around the world about China. Mr. Schwarzman is a member of The Council on Foreign Relations, The Business Council, The Business Roundtable, The International Business Council of the World Economic Forum, and the Berggruen Institute on Governance's 21st Century Council. He serves on the boards of The Asia Society, The Board of Directors of The New York City Partnership, and The Advisory Board of the School of Economics and Management at Tsinghua University, Beijing. In 2007, Mr. Schwarzman was included in TIME's "100 Most Influential People." Mr. Schwarzman holds a B.A. from Yale University and an M.B.A. from Harvard Business School. He has served as an adjunct professor at the Yale School of Management and on the Harvard Business School Board of Dean's Advisors.

Ila. A CONVERSATION WITH THE REPUBLICAN PARTY – CHINESE AMERICANS AND THE 2016 FEDERAL ELECTIONS

In the 2012 election cycle, approximately 90,000 political advertisements were produced concerning China; that same year, key influencers and outlets from Dr. Henry Kissinger to The New Yorker commented that candidates from both parties were appealing to American suspicions of China in their campaigns. As we approach the 2016 elections, the U.S. faces important issues related to China. The Committee of 100 welcomes and encourages constructive debates on these key topics. However, racially-charged messaging and campaign tactics that stimulate suspicion, prejudice, or fear lead to negative consequences for Chinese Americans and other Asian Americans, and detract from the image of the U.S. abroad. Therefore, C-100 is exploring the possibility of a proactive, non-partisan campaign in anticipation of the 2016 Federal Elections. Through this, the Committee seeks to foster an inclusive American society by minimizing irresponsible campaign rhetoric and tactics against Chinese Americans and other Asian Americans. This topic will be divided into two sessions for this conference, one in the morning in conversation with leaders of the Republican Party, and one in the afternoon in conversation with leaders of the Democratic Party.

LANHEE CHEN

Director of Domestic Policy Studies at Stanford University

Member, Committee of 100

Cox has also assisted candidates at all levels throughout New York in numerous election cycles. His writings on public policy have appeared in *The New Republic* magazine, the *Antitrust Law Journal*, and the *New York Post*, and he is co-author of a book on the Federal Trade Commission. He is a proud veteran having joined the Reserve Officers Training Corp (ROTC) at Princeton in 1964. Cox practices corporate and finance law and has served as a member of the Management Committee and the Chairman of the Corporate Department at Patterson Belknap Webb & Tyler LLP.

ALLAN W. FUNG

Mayor of Cranston, Rhode Island



Allan W. Fung is currently the Mayor of Cranston, Rhode Island and was formerly the Republican nominee for Governor in 2014. First elected in 2008, Fung was the first Asian-American Mayor in state history. In office, he has increased commercial development by millions and helped bring in over 1000 jobs. He reduced the city's operational expenses by implementing innovative savings strategies and was the first Mayor in the state to move two major unions into defined contribution plans. He also successfully negotiated reforms with public safety retirees to stabilize the city's pension system. Mayor Fung is a member of the Republican National Committee Asian Pacific American Advisory Committee and the Honorary Board Chairman of the RI Association of Chinese Americans. He served on the RI Municipal Pension Study Commission and was also part of the 2011 RI Pension Advisory Group that recommended reforms to the troubled state pension system. He is Past President of the RI League of Cities and Towns. Before becoming Mayor, he was Government Relations Counsel for MetLife, a prosecutor in the RI Department of Attorney General and a litigation associate with Mandell, Schwartz & Boisclair. Mayor Fung graduated from Rhode Island College and Suffolk University Law School.

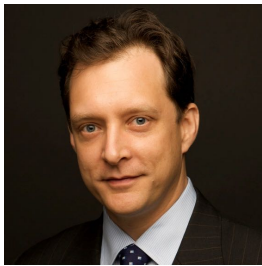

Ambassador Zhang Qiyue started her diplomatic career in 1982. She has rich experience in multilateral and bilateral diplomacy. She served as Ambassador of the People's Republic of China to Belgium and Indonesia respectively. Her previous posts also include the Secretariat of United Nations Headquarters in New York and Chinese Permanent Mission to the United Nations. From 1998 to 2004, she worked as the Spokeswoman of the Chinese Foreign Ministry. She also served as Deputy Director General of the Information Department from 1998 to 2004 and Director General of the Department for Diplomatic Missions Abroad from 2012 to 2014. Ambassador Zhang Qiyue graduated from Beijing Foreign Studies University. She is married, with one son. She has been the Consul General of China in New York since December 29th, 2014.

III. U.S. CHINA CROSS-BORDER INVESTMENTS

For decades, American investment in China far exceeded Chinese investment in the US economy. In the last five years, however, Chinese annual foreign direct investment (FDI) in the US has surged, topping \$10 billion each year in both 2013 and 2014, and, by most measures, now exceeds annual US FDI flows into China. Drawing on their own first-hand experiences, speakers discuss the potential and pitfalls of U.S.-China cross-border investments, the benefits for each country, and the leadership roles that both governments can play in mitigating conflict and ensuring continued openness and success.

THE HONORABLE GARY LOCKE 10th U.S. Ambassador to China



In March 2011, President Barack Obama nominated Gary Locke to be the 10th Ambassador of the United States of America to the People's Republic of China. He was confirmed unanimously by the U.S. Senate and assumed his duties in August 2011, a position he held until March of 2014. Previously, Mr. Locke served as the 36th U.S. Secretary of Commerce where he helped implement President Obama's ambitious agenda to turn around the economy and put people back to work. Before his appointment to the President's Cabinet, Mr. Locke served two terms as the 21st Governor of Washington, the nation's most trade-dependent state. Mr. Locke is the first Chinese American to serve as Ambassador to China, as U.S. Secretary of Commerce, and as Governor. Mr. Locke earned a bachelor's degree in political science from Yale University and a law degree from Boston University.

Raul M. Alvillar is currently the National Political Director at the Democratic National Committee (DNC). THE HONORABLE STAPLETON ROY 5th U.S. Ambassador to China and Founding Director Emeritus, Kissinger Institute on China and the United States



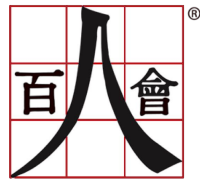

During a career focused on East Asia and the Soviet Union, Stape's ambassadorial assignments included Singapore, China, and Indonesia. His final post with the State Department was as Assistant Secretary for Intelligence and Research. On retirement he joined Kissinger Associates, Inc., a strategic consulting firm, before joining the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars in September 2008 to head the newly created Kissinger Institute. Joe Wong is a standup comedian and TV talk show host. Born in China, Joe came to the United States in 1994 and earned a Ph.D. in Biochemistry at Rice University in Texas in 1999. He then moved to Boston and started to perform stand up comedy in 2002. In April 2009, Wong made his television debut on "Late Show with David Letterman." Very impressed by his performance, Letterman offered Joe a sitcom development deal with his production company, Worldwide Pants. In March 2010, Joe headlined the 66th Radio and TV Correspondents' Dinner in Washington D.C. In 2011, Joe published his autobiography "The Tao of Humor" in China. From 2013 to present, Joe has been hosting a top rated TV show "Is it True?" in China, averaging 5-7 million viewers per episode. Joe has also been touring and promoting American style standup comedy in China.

THE HONORABLE HENRY KISSINGER

56th Secretary of State of the United States



Henry A. Kissinger served as U.S. Secretary of State (1973-1977) and National Security Advisor (1969-1975). At present, Dr. Kissinger is Chairman of Kissinger Associates, Inc., an international consulting firm. He is also a member of the International Council of J.P. Morgan Chase & Co.; a Counselor to and Trustee of the Center for Strategic and International Studies; an Honorary Governor of the Foreign Policy Association; and an Honor Member of the International Olympic Committee. He has served as a member of the Defense Policy Board, Department of Defense, since 2001. His academic career included appointments as a member of the faculty of the Department of Government and the Center for International Affairs at Harvard College, where he became associate director in 1957. He received a Bronze Star from the U.S. Army in 1945 and was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1973, the US Medal of Freedom in 1977, and the Medal of Liberty in 1986.

HIS EXCELLENCY CUI TIANKAI

Ambassador of the People's Republic of China to the United States



His Excellency Cui Tiankai is the Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of the People's Republic of China to the United States of America. Previously, he served as Vice Minister in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (2009-2013), Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of the People's Republic of China to Japan (2007-2009), and Assistant Minister at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (2006-2007). From 2003-2006, Ambassador Cui served as the Director-General of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs' Department of Asian Affairs, and from 2001-2003 as the Director-General of the Ministry's Policy Research Office, where he was Deputy Director-General 1999-2001. Ambassador Cui holds post-graduate degrees from Johns Hopkins University, as well as Shanghai Normal University and Beijing Institute of Foreign Languages.

Cellist



Yo-Yo Ma is a Paris-born Chinese American cellist. Ma grew up in New York City, and as a child prodigy began performing at the age of five. He graduated from Juilliard School and Harvard University and has enjoyed a prolific career as both a soloist performing with orchestras around the world and a recording artist. In 1998 Mr. Ma established the Silk Road Project to promote the study of the cultural, artistic and intellectual traditions along the ancient trade route that stretched from the Mediterranean Sea to the Pacific Ocean. His 90+ albums have received 18 Grammy Awards and Mr. Ma remains one of the best-selling recording artists in the classical field.

leoh Ming Pei was born in Suzhou, China in 1917 and moved to the United States at the age of 17. I. M. Pei has designed some of the most iconic and beloved architectural masterpieces in the world. He is well known for his designs of the East Building of the National Gallery of Art in Washington (1978), the John F. Kennedy Library in Boston (1979), the Grand Louvre in Paris (1989), and Miho Museum in Shiga, Japan (1997). Pei has also completed several projects in China including The Fragrant Hill Hotel in Beijing (1982), the Bank of China Tower in Hong Kong (1989), and the Suzhou Museum in Suzhou (2006). He has been recognized internationally with the highest honors in architecture, arts and letters, and public service.

Henry Tang has been engaged in domestic and global securities and banking activities for several of the largest Wall Street investment banks, among them, Salomon Brothers, Lehman Brothers, Prudential, and Jefferies & Co. Henry Tang is the first recipient of the Asian American Business Achievement Award and was awarded the Ellis Island Medal of Honor as well as the Bridge to Brotherhood Award. CHIEN-SHIUNG WU *in memoriam*

Physicist



Chien-Shiung Wu was a well renowned physicist born in Taicang, China and educated at the University of California, Berkeley. Dr. Wu was known as the "Queen of Nuclear Research". She served on the Manhattan Project and held a number of esteemed academic positions during her lifetime. She is best known for conducting the Wu Experiment, which prompted a revolutionary discovery in nuclear physics and led to a Nobel Prize in 1957 for her colleagues. Wu was the first female president of the American Physical Society, a recipient of the National Medal of Science and was the inaugural recipient of the Wolf Prize in Physics. Dr. Wu's public accomplishments in the sciences lent influence to the original recruitment of members to the Committee of 100.

The Niu family shares Mr. Niu's devotion to philanthropy, and actively participates in the foundation. Mr. Niu's children have also established the Laoniu Brother & Sister Foundation.

President and CEO, Wallace H. Coulter Foundation



Sue Van is the President and CEO of the Wallace H. Coulter Foundation. Its largest program is in translational research in biomedical engineering. Niu Niu is the nickname and performing identity of Shengliang Zhang, born into a musical family in Fujian province, China in 1997. A child prodigy, he made his concert debut in August 2003, a few weeks after his sixth birthday. In 2007 Niu Niu (meaning “Little Ox”) became the youngest pianist ever to sign an exclusive recording contract with an international classical label – EMI Classics now Warner Classics. Since the age of ten, Niu Niu has studied with Professor Hung-Kuan Chen, initially at the Shanghai Conservatory of Music and, more recently, at the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston. Niu Niu now attends the Juilliard School in New York on full scholarship. In July 2008, he released his debut album, “Niu Niu plays Mozart” followed by “Niu Niu plays Chopin-The Complete Études” in 2010 and “Niu Niu Liszt Transcriptions” in 2012. Niu Niu has appeared in recital in many of the world’s most prestigious venues including London’s Wigmore Hall, Beijing National Centre for the Performing Arts, Shanghai Oriental Centre, Suntory Hall Tokyo and Symphony Hall Osaka. He has performed in Switzerland and France with the Zurich Chamber Orchestra, given concerts in Berlin, Hamburg, Dortmund and Essen, and, as first laureate of the Artemisia Foundation, he gave debuts in Boston’s Jordan Hall and Yale University in 2012.

Baritone

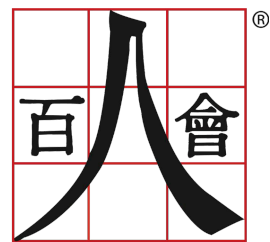

Committee of 100

CELEBRATING *25* YEARS

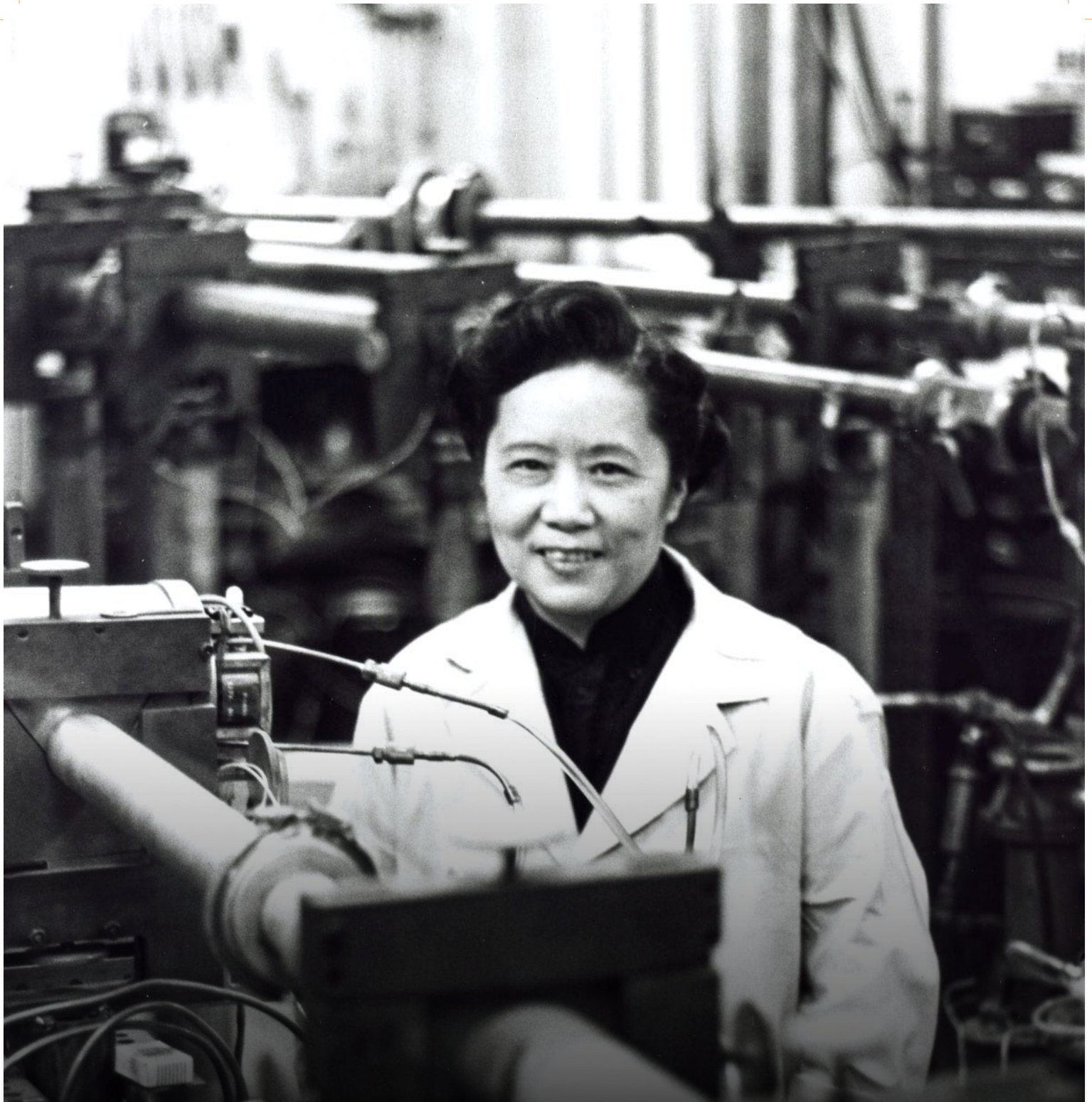


The Committee of 100 was founded in early 1990 to provide a collective voice for Americans of Chinese heritage on both domestic and international issues.

The idea for the Committee came from famed architect I.M. Pei, who received hundreds of calls from reporters seeking his reaction, as a Chinese American, to the Tiananmen Square events in June 1989. Pei felt that no single individual could adequately represent the Chinese American perspective, and instead envisioned a group of prominent Chinese Americans joining together to serve as a voice and resource for the Chinese American community.

By the end of 1990, the core group of I.M. Pei, Yo-Yo Ma, Shirley Young, Oscar Tang, Henry Tang, and Chien-Shiung Wu had recruited forty distinguished Chinese Americans from the arts, business, academia, public service, and the sciences to serve on the Committee of 100. Shirley Young served as the Committee's founding Chairperson.

Seeking Common Ground While Respecting Differences is the precept guiding all Committee actions.



Chien-Shiung Wu (1912 – 1997) Co-founder of the Committee of 100 and pioneering nuclear physicist who changed the accepted view of the structure of the universe and disproved ‘the conservation of parity’, a widely accepted “law” in physics. Wu was a member of the Manhattan Project and her work led to a Nobel Prize awarded to her male colleagues. Wu was born in Shanghai and received her PhD in California. Her public accomplishments in the sciences lent influence to the original recruitment of members to the Committee of 100.



The Committee of 100 held its first conference in New York City in 1991.

The founding members determined that the Committee would be a non-political and non-partisan nonprofit group, but would not shy away from taking stands on public policy issues, including foreign relations, trade policy, civil rights, and social justice.

The first conference in 1991 invited Assistant Secretary of State Richard Holbrooke to speak on “Sino-American Relations in the Age of Gorbachev”. Mr. Alan Wong, a Chinese American nonprofit leader and Executive Director of the San Francisco YMCA gave remarks on the topic of “Chinese Americans: past, present and future.”

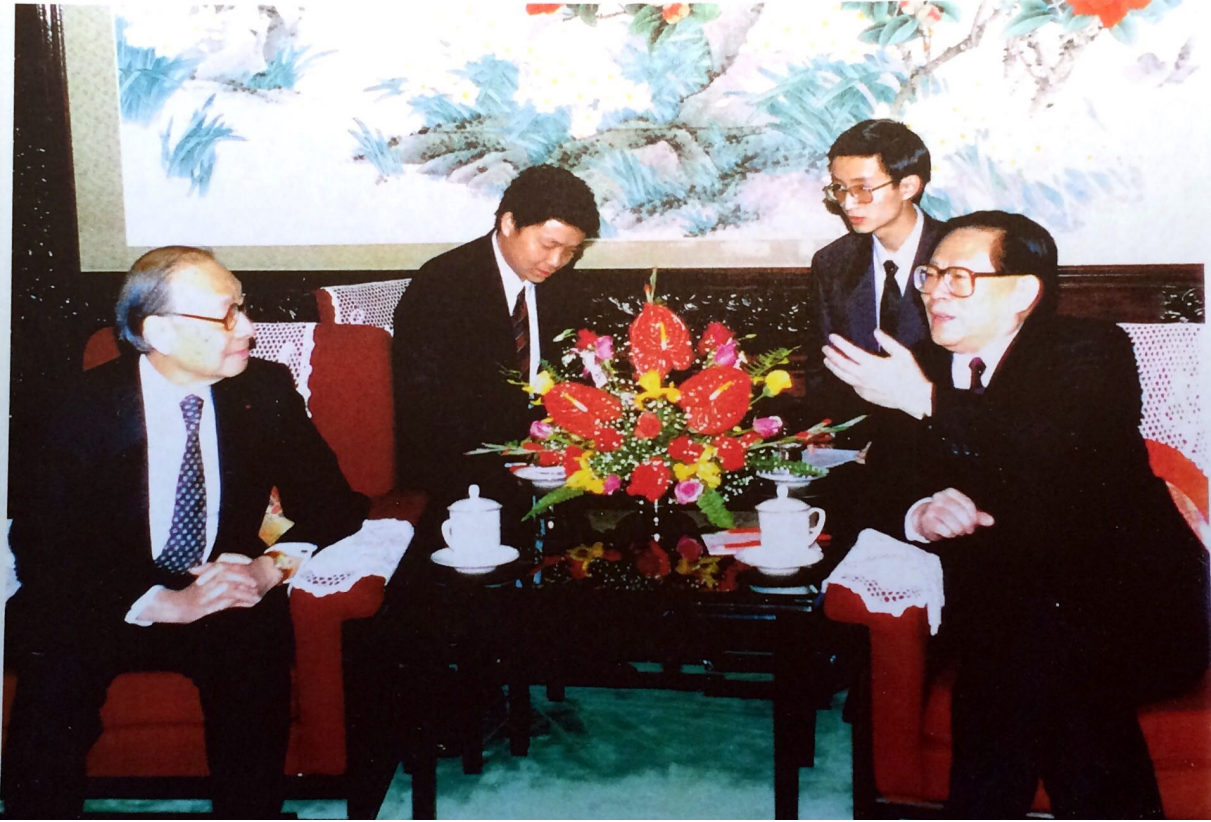
As U.S. citizens of Chinese descent, including American-born and naturalized citizens, Committee members share a natural desire for mutual understanding and peaceful relations between the United States and Greater China.

The Committee of 100’s 25th Anniversary Gala and Summit will be its 24th major annual conference.



1987 – Inception of the Committee of 100

Prior to 1989, I.M. Pei and Henry Kissinger attended a black tie event where Kissinger discussed with Pei the notion of organizing an influential group of Chinese Americans to address issues of international concern between the United States and China.



In 1994, I.M. Pei led the first Committee of 100 Members Delegation to Beijing.

In 1994, the Committee of 100 commissioned Wirthlin Worldwide to conduct a survey on its behalf, entitled "A National Study of Attitudes Toward the People's Republic of China." The findings were presented to President Jiang Zemin, CPPCC Chairman Li Ruihuan. C-100 members also met with Taiwan President Lee Teng-hui. In later years, the committee would commission multiple surveys, tracking the evolution of American and Chinese perceptions towards each other.

1997 – Hong Kong

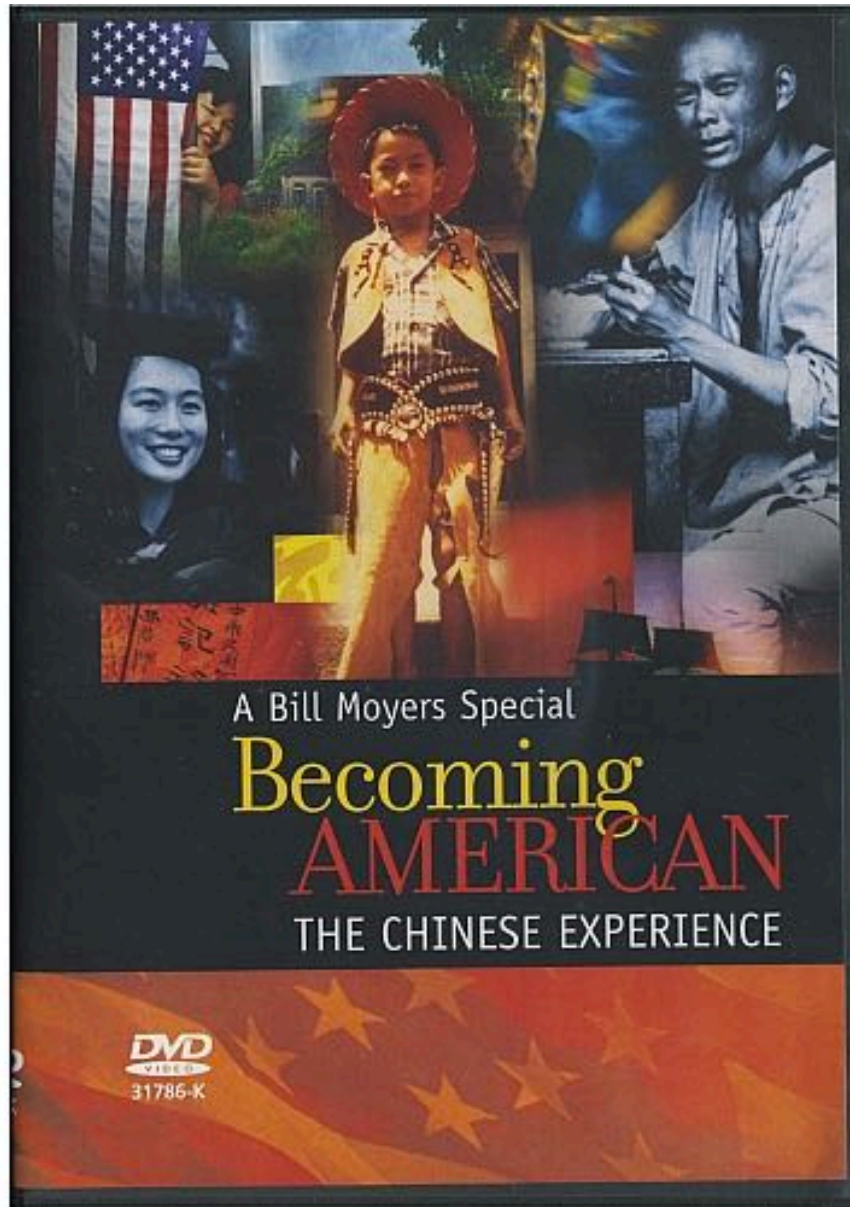
In 1997, the Committee of 100 published “Hong Kong Transition” a background paper with the Asia Society to provide the American media with a better understanding of China’s colonial history.

A C-100 delegation led by Chancellor Chang-lin Tien attended the reunification ceremonies in Hong Kong and Beijing and later visited Taipei.



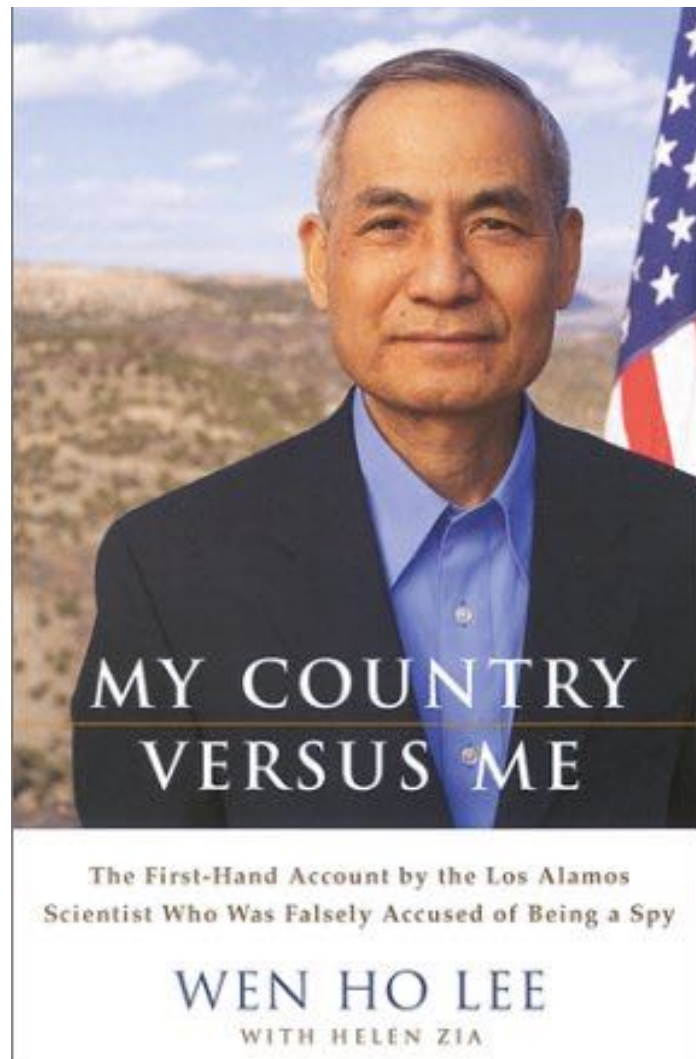
In 1998, Committee of 100 presented “Seeking Common Ground While Respecting Differences” White Paper at the White House.

In 1998, the White House invited the Committee of 100 to present a white paper, “Seeking Common Ground While Respecting Differences,” to National Security Adviser Sandy Berger in preparation for President Bill Clinton’s state visit to China. Passages from the paper are included in President Clinton’s messages given in China.



1999 - 2003 Becoming American: The Chinese Experience (A PBS Series)

In 1999, the Committee of 100 began working with Bill Moyers to secure funds and resources to make the PBS series, *Becoming American: the Chinese Experience*. The series aired on television in March 2003 highlighting the lives and contributions of Chinese Americans. A number of Committee members including Shirley Young, David Ho, and Maya Lin were also interviewed for the program.



1999-2000 The Case of Wen Ho Lee

Dr. Wen Ho Lee was a Taiwanese American scientist who worked for the University of California at the Los Alamos National Laboratory creating simulations of nuclear explosions for scientific inquiry improving the safety and reliability of the U. S. nuclear arsenal. In December 1999, a federal grand jury indicted him of stealing secrets about the U. S. nuclear arsenal for the People's Republic of China (PRC). Lee's name was leaked to the press before any formal charges were filed against him. He was arrested without bail and put into solitary confinement. Committee members led sixteen Asian American organizations in forming a coalition to raise national awareness of the denial of due process in the Wen Ho Lee case of alleged espionage, and leveraged its high level relationships to gain the attention of President Bill Clinton. The White House later sent Secretary of Energy Bill Richardson to address concerns at the Committee of 100's annual conference. A public apology was later issued by a number of media organizations as well as President Clinton himself.

TIMELINE

2001 C-100 publishes the national opinion survey, American Attitudes Towards Chinese Americans and Asian Americans, documenting previously little known facts about American public opinion on China. Thirty-six members led by General John Fugh and C.B. Sung visit Beijing and Shanghai to meet Chinese Premier Zhu Rongji, Chairman of National People's Congress Li Peng and Vice Premier Qian Qichen, respectively. In Hong Kong, Chief Executive C.H. Tung hosts luncheon to greet the members. The delegation also visits Taiwan and meets President Chen Shui-bian and Chairman of KMT Lien Chan.

2002 – C-100 begins partnership with Asia Society to increase knowledge of China and Asia in U.S.'s K-12 education curriculum, and begins highlighting in media the philanthropic contributions of Chinese Americans.

2003 - C-100 expands its reach across the U.S. by creating a regional organization structure and initiating Regional Leadership Forums to inspire young Chinese Americans to greater levels of success through the mentorship of C-100 members. Builds an infrastructure that will support a broader agenda which includes the opening of a Hong Kong office. Launches a project to increase the number of Asian Americans on Fortune 500 boards. Co-sponsors a dinner for Chinese Premier Wen Jiabao in Washington, DC.

2004 -C-100 opens a Greater China office in Hong Kong. That same year, C-100 issues a first-ever Asian Pacific American (APA) Corporate Board Report Card, as a part of C-100's efforts to increase the number and influence of APAs serving as directors on America's most prestigious corporate boards. C

2005 - A delegation of seventeen members led by C.B. Sung makes a Greater China trip, meeting President Chen Shui-bian and Mayor of Taipei Ma Ying-jeou in Taipei, and National People's Congress Chairman Wu Bangguo and State Councilor Tang Jiaxuan in Beijing. The Committee holds its first Annual Greater China Conference, "Bridging the Pacific," in Hong Kong.

Later that year, C-100 commissions a three-phase study American Attitudes toward China to assess the attitudes of the U.S. general public, opinion leaders, congressional staffers, business leaders, and Chinese Americans toward Greater China and U.S.-China relations.

2006 - C-100 hosts a dinner for Chinese President Hu Jintao in Washington, DC on April 20. Gives its first grant of "C-100 Leadership Scholarship" to the winners among 24 Chinese students. U.S. Senator Dianne Feinstein keynotes "Taiwan and the Sino-American Relationship: Thoughtful Management, Consistent Attention" at C-100 Fifteenth Annual Conference in San Francisco.

2007 - C-100 launches the Washington Engagement Initiative to enhance understanding and improve perceptions of China in the U.S. C-100 organizes its first Journalist China Delegation with David Brooks, NYT; Juan Williams, NPR; and Charles Cook, Cook Political Report. C-100 issues a mirror survey, "Hope and Fear: American and Chinese Attitudes Toward Each Other."

2008 - C-100 mobilizes its community to raise \$600,000 to assist communities affected by the Sichuan Earthquake. Per invitation of both the Beijing Olympics Committee and the State Council, C-100 attends the Beijing Olympics opening. C-100 co-hosts a luncheon for Chinese Premier Wen Jiabao in New York and later hosts a forum in Virginia to address the Presidential candidates' approaches to China.



2010, Regret for Chinese Exclusion Laws

As a member of the 1882 Project's steering committee, C-100 joined a coalition in 2010 to lead the call for and eventual passage of Senate Resolution 201 and House Resolution 683 that formally acknowledged and expressed regret at the passage of the Chinese Exclusion Laws. The Chinese Exclusion Act was one of the most significant restrictions on free immigration in US history, prohibiting Chinese immigrants from becoming American citizens for over sixty years. It was the first Federal law that barred a specific ethnicity from American citizenship and was retroactively applied to Chinese laborers already in the United States. Facing deportation and brutal persecution in American society, the Exclusion Act created much suffering for Chinese in America. The Act was finally repealed in 1943 when China became an ally with the United States in WWII.

TIMELINE

2009 - C-100 issues the opinion survey, Still The “Other?”: Public Attitudes Toward Chinese and Asian Americans, in April.

2010 - “The Chinese in America, We are Family” exhibition created by C-100 opens at the USA Pavilion at the Shanghai World Expo. C-100 brings to China four influential American journalists: Rana Foroohar, Deputy Editor of Newsweek; John Gapper, Associate Editor and Columnist of The Financial Times; David Ignatius, Associate Editor and Columnist of The Washington Post; and Tavis Smiley, Host of Tavis Smiley of PBS and The Tavis Smiley Show of PRI. C-100 hosts a meeting with President of Taiwan Ma Ying-jeou in January in San Francisco. On May 4,



2011 - C-100 hosts a Congressional briefing on the U.S.-China relationship on Capitol Hill. More than 70 Congressional members and staff participate. C-100 Chairman John Chen speaks on a symposium, America's Next Chapter, a live broadcasting program on C-SPAN. John Chen and some members attend the State Dinner in honor of President Hu Jintao at the White House. C-100 serves as one of the hosting organizations for a luncheon in honor of President Hu.

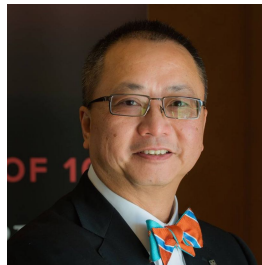
2012 - C-100 Wanxiang Teaching Scholars pilot program takes place and 18 American High School teachers receive a three-week field study in China that highlights an enriched curriculum integrating Chinese language and culture with China's sustainability developments. In October, C-100 convenes “China Policy Debate: Democratic & Republican Presidential Race 2012” at the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies.

2013 - The Committee, in collaboration with the Chinese Institute of Engineers USA – Seattle Chapter, conducted a workshop on the “Unique Challenges & Risks for Chinese Americans in Science and Technology,” launching a series of training workshops to proactively educate Chinese American scientists on the rising incidence of espionage cases in America.



In 2014, Committee of 100 celebrated 35 years of Sino-U.S. Diplomatic Relations at the Diaoyutai State Guesthouse

In December of 2014, the Committee of 100 co-hosted a special forum honoring the 35th anniversary of U.S.-China diplomatic relations with the Overseas Chinese Affairs Office of the State Council at the historic Diaoyutai State Guesthouse. Ambassador Nicholas Platt was the keynote speaker invited by C-100, who spoke on his perceptions of the evolution of US-China relations since his post as a State Department official on the historic visit to China with President Nixon in February of 1972.

Major General John Liu Fugh (1934 – 2010) was a decorated member of the U.S. Army and Chairman of the Committee of 100 from 2006-2009. Fugh was the first Chinese American to serve as General Officer in the U.S. Army and the first and only minority individual to serve as Judge Advocate General.

The Committee of 100 focuses its efforts in three core program areas:

- **CHINESE AMERICANS FOR GREATER INCLUSION**
- **U.S.-CHINA TRUST-BUILDING**
- **NEXT-GENERATION LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT**

1. US-CHINA TRUST-BUILDING

C-100 Member Delegations – Since the Committee’s inception, C-100 members have led regular diplomatic delegations to Beijing, Hong Kong, and Taipei to discuss current issues pertaining to U.S.-China relations with prominent political and business leaders. In addition, C-100 conducts public outreach in the United States and regularly meets with American officials who focus on China policy in Congress, the White House, and the U.S. Departments of State, Commerce, and Defense. With unique access in Washington D.C. and on both sides of the Taiwan Strait, C-100 is one of the only groups that can successfully navigate cross-strait and US-China relations at the highest levels while maintaining a position as a neutral bridge.

C-100 China Delegations Program – C-100 began sending annual delegations of American opinion and civic leaders to China in 2007. To date, ten trips have brought a total of 26 American opinion leaders and 18 civic leaders to China. C-100’s most recent China Delegation included Howard Fineman, Editorial Director of The Huffington Post; Brian Gallagher, Editorial Page Editor of USA TODAY; Mark Halperin, Editor at Large of Time Magazine; and Ruth Marcus, Columnist for The Washington Post. Delegates gain a firsthand view on issues pertaining to U.S.-China relations, Chinese foreign policy and national security issues, intellectual and artistic trends, the economy, civil society, youth, journalism and social media, banking and finance, the environment, and the political system.

Public Perceptions Opinion Survey – C-100’s signature research product measures the perceptions of Americans and Chinese on key issues affecting U.S.-China relations. C-100’s signature surveys began in 1994 and produced reports in 2001, 2005, 2007, and 2012, tracking attitudinal shifts in American and Chinese perceptions towards each other over more than a decade.

As China rapidly grows as a world superpower, creating new opportunities and challenges for the United States and the world, C-100 continues to leverage its highly regarded membership of Chinese American leaders to serve as a substantive bridge to champion constructive exchange with China.

2. CHINESE AMERICANS FOR GREATER INCLUSION

For a quarter century, the Committee of 100 has sought to leverage its well-regarded membership to serve as a collective voice, bringing mainstream visibility to important issues concerning Chinese Americans. In 2000, C-100 led sixteen Asian American organizations in forming a coalition to raise national awareness of the denial of due process in the Wen Ho Lee case of alleged espionage. In 2005, the Committee compiled data from that year's Fortune 500 listings in order to highlight the ongoing importance of building a pipeline of qualified Asian Pacific Americans for key board appointments, especially given the particular links and talents they bring with regard to the Pacific Rim. C-100 issued the "APA Corporate Report Card Updates" based on the 2006 Fortune 500 listings. In 2010, as a member of the 1882 Project's steering committee, C-100 led the call for and eventual passage of Senate Resolution 201 and House Resolution 683 that formally acknowledged and expressed regret at the passage of the Chinese Exclusion Laws.

In 2012, C-100 launched a series of workshops, "Unique Challenges & Risks for Chinese Americans in Science and Technology," for Chinese and Chinese Americans working in the technology sector. In 2013, C-100 co-hosted book presentations in New York and Los Angeles on *Forbidden Citizens: Chinese Exclusion and the U.S. Congress* following the 1882 Project's efforts to put forth an historical acknowledgement by Congress of the injustices of the Chinese Exclusion laws. C-100 monitors and releases official statements on key issues facing the Asian American community, such as immigration reform, the impact of China-bashing on Chinese and Asian Americans. Most recently, statements were released denouncing California Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 5 (SCA-5), and Fox News analyst Bob Beckel's July 2014 remarks on Chinese students in the U.S.

As we approach the 2016 elections, the U.S. faces important issues related to Chinese in America. Committee members and stakeholders have raised concerns over racially-charged messaging and campaign tactics used in election campaigns that stimulate suspicion, prejudice, or fear lead to negative consequences for Chinese Americans and other Asian Americans, detracting from the image of the U.S. abroad. To foster and respect an inclusive American society, especially in the lead up to the next federal election, the Committee will be exploring ways to minimize irresponsible campaign rhetoric and tactics that hurt Chinese Americans and other Asian Americans.

3. NEXT-GENERATION LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

As leaders in their respective fields and communities, Committee of 100 members actively mentor and cultivate next-generation leaders. In 2005, the Committee of 100 launched the Leadership Scholarship Program (LSP) in partnership with over ten universities in China to help Chinese post-graduates reach their greatest potential through scholarships. Through a competitive selection process, students are awarded for their dedication to social responsibility, academic excellence, and leadership potential. Since its inception, the program has awarded over 200 scholarships.

In Los Angeles, San Francisco, New York, Washington D.C., and Beijing, C-100 members volunteer their time to provide emerging leaders unique opportunities to learn directly from their paths to success. Since its inception, C-100 has engaged nearly 2,000 next generation leaders in one-on-one mentorship opportunities with C-100 members, advancing the organization's goals to develop a robust pipeline of future Asian American leaders and U.S.-China bridge-builders.

Looking ahead, C-100 is planning a new model of collaboration to leverage the passion and resourcefulness of its membership to significantly grow and elevate the impact of organizations and initiatives in the field of next-generation leadership development, US-China bridge-building and Asian American advancement.
